TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

The following is a statement based on my observation and judgment concerning the professional capability and teaching skill of Dr. Judith Tyberg.

During the summer of 1952 at this college Dr. Tyberg was a member of an instructional staff which I brought together to teach and lead a seminar and institute on modern India. The situation was such as to provide every staff member with a full opportunity to observe the work of all others.

In the case of Dr. Tyberg, it is perfectly clear she commands a tremendous range of knowledge and insight into the workings of modern Indian society based on both direct experience and intensive study. While it is so that her special fields are language and philosophy she is able to discuss in detail and with clarity many aspects of Indian life which would come under the heading of sociology.

To speak very frankly, one's first impressions of her skill as teacher are likely to be found very faulty. In a few meetings with a class she establishes a rapport and confidence with students. In my opinion, she is very capable in the teaching art. Ninety people were in the class she instructed and I should judge at least thirty told me personally they felt her performance in the class was exceptionally effective.
